


FMH Clothing Drive:



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If you are planning to retire and give notice by January 15th, you are entitled to a \$1,500.00 payment. Article 101 of the

negotiated agreement states, "A teacher who gives irrevocable written notice of retirement effective at the end of the school year to Human Resources on or before January 15 will receive a one-time payment of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) in the final paycheck at the end of the year." Please send an email to Human Resources or use the <u>Notice of</u> <u>Resignation/Retirement Form</u>.

If you are placed on a Plan of Improvement, please reach out to FEA immediately so that we can help you navigate this. It is important for all parties involved to ensure due process that a representative be involved at the beginning as the goals and timelines are being established. Pursuant to Article 409 of the negotiated agreement, the role of the FEA representative is to consult with the teacher in setting clear, specific performance expectations, to take notes, and to ask clarifying questions during meetings, as needed.

The negotiated agreement between FEA and the District has some new contract language in Article 518 regarding visitor expectations. The language was a collaboration between all three unions and the District. You should expect to see these visitor expectations in your buildings - possibly by the front office, visitor sign-in log, or in rooms where IEPs and SSTs are frequently held. While we hope you don't need to reference these expectations, please refer to these guidelines as needed and report violations to your building administrators so appropriate documentation occurs.


